



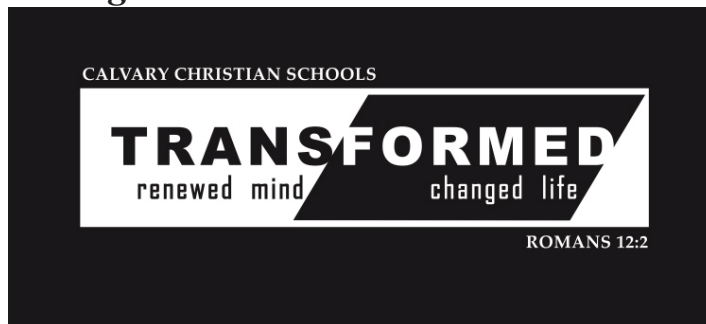

To Begin With: "And Enoch Was No More..."



Each year we have a new theme that we introduce at High School Retreat, and they use periodically throughout the year in chapel and other events. This year's theme is "Transformed: Renewed Mind, Changed Life" based on Romans 12:2.

Back in September, I told our CCS high school students that there was a young man, a junior, who wanted very much to be with them this school year, but we were having difficulty getting him to Calvary. I explained that the first obstacle was distance. He lives more than 12,000 miles away. The second obstacle was resistance from forces beyond our control. You see, he lives in a country that does not let places like Calvary Christian Schools exist. In fact, they would not let the various churches and youth groups represented in our school exist. (In his country, students under the age of 18 are not allowed to attend church.) In fact, this young man's father is a pastor who just finished serving a 2.5 year prison term after their church was raided by authorities.

I was limited to what I could say, but I told our students, "This young man who wishes he were here with you right now lives in China. Had our plan worked to get him here, he would be in the Junior Class. His name means "walks with

God." It comes from the verse is Genesis 5:24, 'And Enoch walked with God and was no more because God took him.'" Talk about a transformed life. POOF! Gone! Hebrews 11:5 says Enoch did not experience death. The Enoch I spoke of is a modern-day Enoch. He also desires the path God has for him, but getting to that path is going to take a miracle."

Enoch had learned of Calvary from a friend of mine, the Chinese refugee/pastor who spoke at our Fall Banquet in 2015 (whose name we choose not to include here). Within a week of his release from prison, Enoch's father began a plan to see if his son could come to Calvary. That was when Enoch and I began daily email communication. Calvary sent everything he needed to come to Calvary (for the visa process, etc.), but the first attempt had been rejected. We sent all new paperwork again in October in hopes that Enoch could arrive by November, but that paperwork was intercepted. (The links at the end of these paragraphs are about this pastor whose alias is "Yang Hua" which means "Look up to Jehovah.")

We continued to pray and to carefully comply with US or China immigration procedures for international students. In December, CCS made its third and final attempt to get the necessary documents to Enoch (though this time at a different address). The

sequence of events was a nail-biter that we won't discuss here. Enoch said more than once in his emails, "God is in control of tomorrow." In that spirit, we kept praying, but I confess it seemed unlikely to happen.

Then on the day before New Year's Eve, 2018, I received an email from Enoch. His contact had gotten the packet; he had gone to the consulate alone AND THIS TIME HE HAD GOTTEN HIS VISA. Pause... There are many other details I cannot share, but upon returning after Christmas Break, I went to the Junior Bible Class to update them on their future classmate. "I know we've been praying since September, and he is not 'out of the woods yet,'" I told them, "but Lord willing, Enoch may be here Wednesday night." Their faces beamed.

Enoch's plane did arrive as prayed for, his daily presence continues to be cause for celebration at Calvary. It is cause for celebration for his parents and a few "guardian angels" who helped make it happen and who must remain nameless, but to thousands of people in his life, Enoch simply "was no more."

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I often use this space to talk with you about the things that set CCS apart from other schools- our distinctives. With a mission statement that guides us to equip students toward personal excellence and pursuit of God's purpose for their lives, it does make our school special. But, what comes to YOUR mind when I ask, "What sets CCS apart?" Small size; personal attention; spiritual training and instruction; academics; friends; extracurricular activities...you might answer any of these. The answers I hear most commonly from people are "Faith" and "Family". In God's economy, could there be any higher calling for a school? Are there any lessons more important for us to teach our children than to love God and love others? We are a Faith Family.

God's Word tells us that He often uses the hard times in our lives to teach us to cling to Him, cling to each other and learn lessons we might not otherwise grasp. Our school family experienced one of these hard times in December as our student, Luke Anhalt, lay on the gym floor in cardiac arrest. Most of you have heard and read about the details of the medical response. God had prepared for this event, placing the necessary equipment (AED) and personnel at Luke's side. Are there any words sufficient to express our gratitude to God and to each person who played a part in saving Luke's life? Not often do we see such dramatic miracles. Glory to God in the Highest!

Let's expand our focus beyond that spot on the gym floor. What else was happening? Word was being spread at the speed of text messages, and almost instantaneously, our Faith Family was alerted. The news struck us to the marrow- because we are Family. Even those who do not personally know the Anhalts, grieved- because we are Family. But we are not just a family, we are a family of Faith. In West Michigan and beyond, people dropped to their knees in Faith and interceded for Luke. We were galvanized together in heartfelt, persistent prayer and it was God's pleasure to say, "Yes!" God values communities of Faith and He has blessed ours at CCS.



Let's not move forward without growing. In Ephesians, Paul instructed us to be "...built up until we reach unity in the faith and the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ." Everything happens in our lives to help us become more like Christ. Will you join me in thinking deeply about the lessons God is teaching us through this? What have you learned about Him? What have you learned about prayer? What have we learned about ourselves as a Faith Family? Will we let these lessons change us? Please join me in asking God to continue to grow us in our Faith and bond us together as Family. Let's grow in God this year.

We are truly, deeply, grateful.

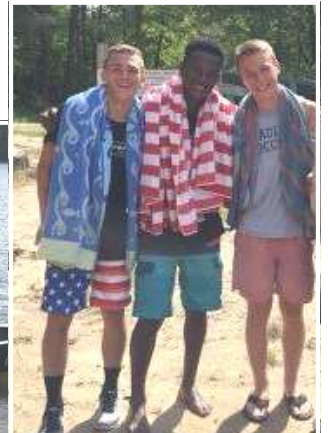

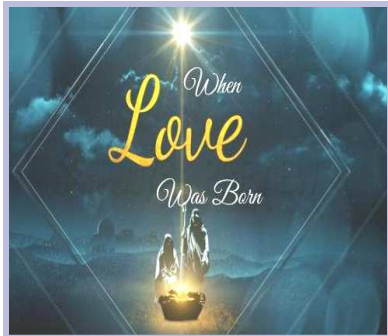
2018 High School Retreat

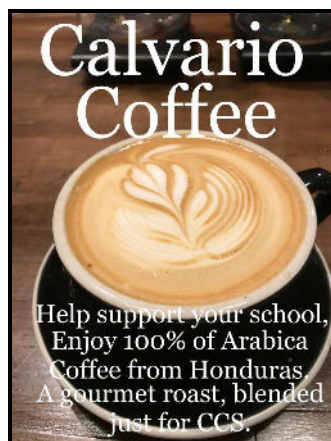

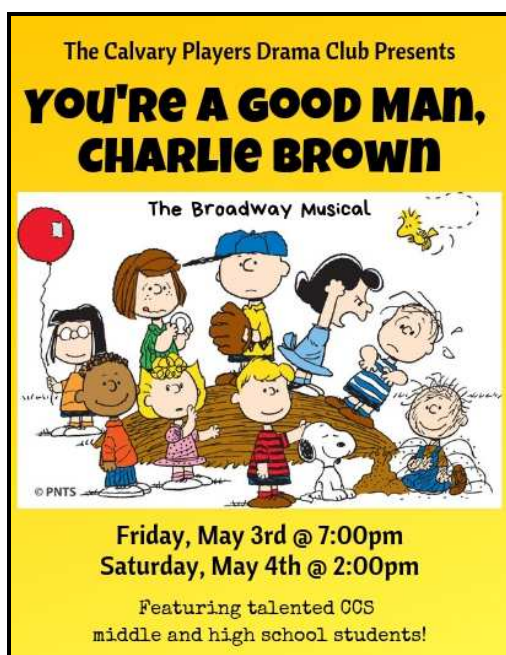
